



Service Dog Policy

For the safety of all who attend the Warehouse Club and to protect those for whom a service dog provides a legitimate service, the following information has been provided.

According to the Pinellas County Department of Justice and the American's with Disabilities Act, a service dog is any dog that is individually trained to do work or perform tasks for the benefit of an individual with a disability, including a physical, sensory, psychiatric, intellectual, or other mental disability. Other species of animals, whether wild or domestic, trained, or untrained, are not service animals for the purposes of this definition. The work or tasks performed by a service animal must be related to the handler's disability.

- Dogs must be current on vaccinations and county licensing; Dogs must be leashed, harnessed and in the control of the owner.
- Emotional support, therapy, comfort, or companion dogs are not considered service dogs and therefore not allowed in the building – **No exceptions. Not even just this one time!**
- Owner must be in full control of the animal always through voice, signal, or other effective means.
- Service dogs are not required to be registered as such nor do they need to be in service vests. The vest merely helps people to identify that the dog is not a pet. Do not engage with service dogs, they are working.
- If you are not sure if it is a service dog, you must ask: Is this a service dog and what service does it provide?
- All dogs must be trained and not in training.
